### From Pastor Diane

Dear BLC Community,

Over the last few Sundays there's a theme in my sermons: outreach. Call it what you like – evangelism, or witness, or sharing the gospel – I've been encouraging you to find ways to share your Jesus story.

This is intentional on my part, and there are several reasons. First and foremost, the bible texts we are reading call us to this theme. We are now in the season of Pentecost, and the lectionary (the three-year cycle of scripture readings that we follow) is leading us through the birth of the early church after Jesus's ascension into heaven. Those first disciples and followers, filled with the Holy Spirit, spread the good news, first in Jerusalem, and then beyond, and the church grew.

The second reason I am preaching about outreach – about getting comfortable talking about faith and inviting friends to church – is because this is part of our Christian identity overall. Just as Jesus traveled through the villages and towns of Palestine preaching the good news that God had come near, and that in him all things were being made new, so we are invited to do the same as his followers. We tell the story in speech that makes sense in our time, and we relate it to our own experience, but it is the same message of God's free gifts of grace, forgiveness, love, community, and ministry.

The third reason is because of where you are, Bethlehem, in this time and place. In your Ministry Site Profile, the document created by the call committee with your input to describe BLC to potential pastors, you note that attendance, membership, and especially youth ministries, have all trended downward in the past 15 years. Included among your goals is to "invite and welcome more: more people, more families, more kinds of people, not for the moreness but to share what we have." You note that it is your purpose as a congregation to "Share the love of God through our programs and in our daily lives." You note that you seek a pastor who will help you "step out of your comfort zone."


And finally, here are your top four mission priorities:

• Exploring and expanding our comfort zone when talking about bringing people to Christ (as Lutherans, this is outside of our comfort zone).

• Expanding our diversity (age, race, socio-economical).

• Enthusiastic collaboration with other congregations at the clergy level to develop working relationships for community programs.

• Re-energize the gifts and talents of all members to serve the congregation and the community

### Second Mile Sunday

On June 13, Bethlehem Lutheran Church and the Sierra Pacific Synod will focus on supporting The Lutheran Office of Public Policy (LOPP). This is a ministry of public policy education and advocacy on matters of hunger and economic justice, the health and integrity of God's creation, and human rights and human dignity. It serves the California expressions of the ELCA as they seek to express God's love and care for our neighbors – especially the "least of these" - who experience poverty, deprivation, and discrimination. Priorities for LOPP are determined by a Policy Council appointed by the ELCA bishops in California. Issue areas and specific positions on public policy choices must be within the framework and direction of ELCA social statements, including The Church in Society: A Lutheran Perspective ; Sufficient, Sustainable Livelihood for All; Caring for Health – Our Shared Endeavor; Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice; Our Calling in Education; Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity, and Culture; and Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust. Guidance is also provided by ELCA social messages and policy resolutions, and synod assembly actions. Priority issue areas have included poverty and the state budget, policies affecting children or immigrants, health care, fair and adequate taxation, and energy policy/climate change. Since "direct democracy" is a declining feature of public life in California, the LOPP Policy Council also makes recommendations on selected ballot propositions where issues of poverty, human rights, and care for creation are at stake.

### Pentecost

The name Pentecost comes from the Greek word meaning "fiftieth." Originally, the name Pentecost referred to a Jewish harvest festival known as the Festival of Weeks. This festival was also called Pentecost because it took place seven full weeks or fifty days after the Feast of Firstfruits. However, fifty days after Jesus' resurrection, the Holy Spirit appeared as tongues of fire above the heads of Jesus' Apostles and gave them the ability to speak in tongues, which is foreign languages they never knew before. Afterward, the Apostles preached to the Jews who had gathered in Jerusalem for Pentecost about how Jesus was their savior. On that day, 3,000 people came to faith in Jesus and the Christian church was born. Today, the Christian Church celebrates this special event 50 days after Jesus' resurrection on the Day of Pentecost.

Santa Rosa's Habitat Restore is located at 1201 Piner Street. Free pick-up service is available for larger items.
